CHURCHES, CHANNELS OF HOPE

Churches, Channels of Hope continues to offer the tools to transform and equip faith communities. The Facilitator Training builds the capacity of faith and community leaders to become competent partners in the response to HIV. This very rich curriculum offers sufficient content for various HIV related interventions and workshops

In the CCoH facilitator feedback reports we received a very touching account of a facilitator and pastor in Zimbabwe and his experience with one of his male congregants who struggled to disclose his HIV status. He reflects:

"This opened my eyes to one of the many untold stories of HIV positive people. In spite of all the media campaigns, stigma is still a major issue among faith communities. It's also evident that behavior chance is not assumed to happen because we have adverts on condoms and other interventions. People need to be engaged, one on one creates that personal touch. I now take more time with Christian men. Men generally are said hard to test (for HIV), in faith communities it's even harder."

In 2018 CABSA presented the Facilitator Training twice: one in Wellington, for a group of mostly URCSA and AFM pastors, and one in Johannesburg. Both groups were quite small, but the discussions and engagements were as lively and passionate as

Comments after the training included:

"I am more alert as to what people living with HIV goes through and the stigma involved. I am more empowered to speak out against stigma and discrimination."

"(My congregation) will be exposed to accurate and relevant information regarding HIV and therefore be lead to a more comprehensive understanding of HIV."

BIBLE MESSAGE AND SPECIAL LITURGIES

One of CABSA's core services is the development and distribution of a weekly Bible Message. These messages use the prescribed texts of the Revised Common Lectionary and explore its relevance for faith communities and Christians in a time of HIV.

A variety of pastors, partners and trained facilitators help to write these messages. Currently over 1400 people are registered and receive this message per email every week.

HIV FARM PROJECT

This project is running for a third year and is made possible by the partnership with the CHABAHIVA Trust and the financial support of Otto Per Mille of the Waldensian Church in Italy. The project consists of three components: peer educator recruitment and training, follow-up meetings and joint community activities.

The aim of the project is to empower peer educators with the necessary knowledge, attitudes, tools and confidence to share HIV information with family, friends and colleagues and to support those who already live with HIV.

Some peer educators commented on the highlight of the training:

- "Everything in the training was a highlight. The practical parts of the training made a big impact and I understand everything that I had questions about so much better."
- "To be able to talk about sex, because it wasn't always comfortable to speak about it, but now I am able to speak about sex."

In 2018, CABSA trained 47 new peer educators from farms in Wellington and De Doorns. One peer educator had disclosed her status to only one person in the 15 years of living with HIV and had always refused to use ARVs. She disclosed her status to the trainers during the workshop and has consequently started her treatment.

The project also included two refresher trainings for peer educators trained in 2016-2017 and in De Doorns a community workshop was organized by the peer educators taking own initiative.

CABSA and the peer educators worked together to host a Family Health Day in each area. In Wellington it was attentded by 250 adults and children, of whom 68 participated in health screening. In De Doorns over 500 adults and children attended and 157 participated in health

Testing was offered by NORSA, a local NGO contracted by the Department of Health to provide HIV counselling and testing.

THURSDAYS IN BLACK AND ADVOCACY



One of CABSA's guiding principles is to uphold and restore the dignity and worth of every human being. We believe that all people are created equal in the image of God and therefore we also have the responsibility to break the silence and speak the truth in the face of injustice.

Funding from the National Lotteries Commission enabled CABSA to present a Transformative Justice Workshop for trained facilitators and partner organisations in Gauteng. Themes addressed included power, advocacy, human rights and the role of Christians in advocacy.

One participant commented:

"It challenged the way I used to do things, think (and) my behaviour, also my communication style. To be in a workshop like this, challenges your stereotypes. I (now have) broader information that is useful to me, my church and

Gender-based violence remains a major injustice that no one can or should ignore. While statistics and distressing news could make one feel helpless and hopeless, the Thursdays in Black campaign (TiB) presents a simple, yet powerful movement that challenges us to voice our protest and concern through more than just words. It challenges us to wear black every Thursday and to demonstrate our objection using our bodies as canvas of protest.

CABSA has supported and actively promoted the TiB campaign since 2013, whilst developing and funding the TiB website. Due to reduced capacity, it was decided to donate this website to the We Will Speak Out Coalition in South Africa. It was a difficult decision, but CABSA has in no way parted with Thursdays in Black. We continue to support and actively promote TiB through all our services.

In 2018, the pin and bookmark were translated into Afrikaans, SeSotho, IsiXho and IsiZulu.
