In order to help people of faith hear God's voice amidst the HIV epidemic, CABSA offers a weekly Bible Message and special liturgies for AIDS Candlelight Memorial and World AIDS Day. These messages use the prescribed texts of the *Revised Common Lectionary* and explore its relevance for faith communities and Christians in a time of HIV. Currently 885 people are registered for this free service.

## **CHURCHES, CHANNELS OF HOPE**



"I am definitely leaving here a different person than when I came," were the words shared by one participant at the Churches, Channels of Hope (CCoH) Facilitator training in July 2019.

Others commented:

"I always thought of my involvement as secondary, by preaching and awareness making. I realised that I have a much greater responsibility in educating people and empowering them."

"This training filled in the blind spots that I had about HIV and AIDS."

"(I look) at HIV and AIDS with another eye. (The training) was so deep and spiritual . . . Godly."

"To be in the company of a diverse group was amazing."

Churches, Channels of Hope is another precious gift that CABSA was entrusted with and is the programme used to support and empower churches, faith and community leaders, and marginalised communities.

Churches, Channels of Hope consists of three different training curriculums:

#### Facilitator Training

This 7-day training empowers and challenges faith leaders on a personal level to discover what it means for them to be a channel of hope in the church or community she or he belongs to. This training was presented twice in 2019 - once in the Western Cape, where it was attended by 12 faith leaders and once in Gauteng. This group consisted of 20 faith leaders from various provinces and one travelled all the way from Kenya.

#### • HIV Integrating Training

The HIV Integrating training is a 3-day workshop available for any literate group who wants to make sense of what HIV means in their personal, spiritual and professional capacities. It was presented once to 7 URCSA pastors in the Eastern Cape.

#### HIV Peer Educator Training

This 5-day workshop is suitable for functionally literate people. It equips peer educators to reach out to friends, families and colleagues in order to share accurate information and healthy attitudes. In the workplace context, the training was presented twice as part of the HIV Farm Project and once for adolescent girls and young women in the Western Cape.

## **HIV FARM PROJECT AND CHABAHIVA TRUST**

CABSA is privileged to report on the continued collaboration with and support from the CHABAHIVA Trust. As part of this partnership, CABSA was invited to the CHABAHIVA International Steering Committee Meeting in Mkhondo, Mpumalanga. Subsequently CABSA was asked to facilitate a Peer Educator Consultation in Johannesburg, Gauteng.

However, the main focus of this partnership is still the implementation of the HIV Farm Project in the Western Cape. In the fourth year of this project, existing activities in De Doorns continued, activities in Wellington were scaled down and some activities were introduced in Caledon.

The primary focus of the project is on HIV awareness through peer educators in the agricultural sector. In the process it also develops leadership and promotes human dignity and healthier relationships.

One peer educator wrote about her experience:

"... thanks to everyone who encouraged me not to lose hope. You were always there when I needed you the most ... I was hopeless, but the day I broke the silence, you were my strength . . . Only God knows I don't have words but thanks."

Others wrote about the training:

"I can now look at people through God's eyes."

"It was presented very well and not at all what I expected. The discussions and how we complimented each other was a highlight."

And a workshop participant whose close relative is HIV positive, shared that because of the workshop he is able "to love her better."

## YOUNG WOMEN & MEN, ADVOCACY AND GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE



"The HIV epidemic holds a mirror up to the inequalities and injustices faced by women and girls and how the gaps in rights and services are exacerbating the epidemic," stated Winnie Byanyima, Executive Director of UNAIDS. "This is unacceptable, it is avoidable and it must end."

AIDS is still the leading cause of death for women aged between 15 and 49 years. In addition, about 6000 young women aged between 15 and 24 years are infected with HIV every week. Confronted with this grim reality, CABSA cannot but continue our gender advocacy role. As an organisation, we also felt challenged and motivated to scale up our youth-focussed activities.

- Gender Equity Session with 26 students from 23 different countries attending the African Leadership Institute for Community Transformation
- Gender Introduction Workshops to 3 groups of students from the Huguenot College
- Distribution of Thursdays in Black (TiB) material
