When I paged through this annual report, I was almost surprised to see photos where we are wearing masks and recalled all the challenging workshops we conducted on COVID-19 vaccine readiness. Can it really be only a year ago when we started to breathe freer from the COVID-19 pandemic? And this also leaves the question, are we also breathing freer when it comes to the HIV pandemic?

The answer is complicated, because with early access to medication, an HIV diagnosis does not have to be a death sentence and therefore we can dream with UNAIDS about the end of AIDS as a public health crisis by 2030. Also, the increased use of ARV medication for HIV prevention, has the potential to reduce new HIV infections significantly.

This is good news, for CABSA, for everyone living with HIV and for communities and churches who are empowered through this information and services. However, there is still a huge gap between what is possible and what is real in Southern Africa.


According to UNAIDS 250 000 adolescent girls and young women acquired HIV in 2021 and 82% of them live in sub-Saharan Africa. In South Africa there were 575 new HIV infections every day and between 130 and 230 AIDS related deaths per day.

At present, it is estimated that 8,5 million people are living with HIV in South Africa alone.

I do not know if I will witness the end of the HIV pandemic. I do not know how much longer CABSA will be able to serve faith and marginalised communities. But I do know that the same God who carried us through the COVID-19 pandemic, still journeys with each of us today.

We are deeply grateful to each of you who have been journeying with CABSA and who supported and enabled us in different ways.

It is my prayer that this God, our God, will breathe over us and continue to nurture the seeds CABSA planted and watered to bloom as beacons of hope, love and transformation amidst the HIV pandemic.

Introduction

CABSA's Churches, Channels of Hope Programme was piloted in 2002 and implemented since February 2003. Over the years it has become the main vehicle through which CABSA serves and equips faith and marginalised communities to respond comprehensively to the changing challenges HIV, AIDS and related issues pose in our communities.

This programme consists of different elements that are all designed to build the capacity and resilience of faith and community leaders, and peer educators to be channels of hope in their respective churches, communities, workplaces, peer groups and families.

A variety of different training and workshop curriculums is available as part of the Churches, Channels of Hope Programme. CABSA is grateful to report that in 2022 we were able to offer four of these curriculums: HIV Facilitator Training, Peer Educator Training, COVID-19 Vaccine Workshops and Faith and Community Leader Workshops.

Facilitator training

This training equips faith leaders, spiritual workers and pastors with the knowledge and skills to lead their congregations and/or communities towards a comprehensive and competent HIV response within a framework that acknowledges and engages with the intersection between other related issues like gender-based violence (GBV), gender equity, poverty and substance abuse.

We are thankful for our continued partnership with Diaconia that makes this training possible. In 2022 we welcomed eight faith leaders from the Northern- and Western Cape at Stillebosch Retreat to be trained as facilitators. That is eight congregations and/or communities, who can now be empowered to respond responsibly to the HIV pandemic. During the six-day course, spanning over two blocks, participants are trained, not only in facilitation, but also how to address the physical, spiritual, systemic and theoretical aspects of the pandemic in a holistic way.

Covid-19 Vaccine Workshops

In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, CABSA started facilitating vaccine workshops in 2021. At the time it was urgent and timely to address the fears, concerns and stigma related to COVID-19 and the available vaccines.

In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, CABSA started facilitating vaccine workshops in 2021. At the time it was urgent and timely to address the fears, concerns and stigma related to COVID-19 and the available vaccines.

In 2022 CRS (Catholic Relief Service) utilized CABSA's services to co-facilitate nine COVID-19 vaccine workshops in three provinces of South Africa, five in the Eastern Cape, two in Gauteng and two workshops in KwaZulu-Natal.

CABSA, in partnership with CHABAHIVA Trust and World Vision International, I facilitated another nine in-person, one-day COVID-19 Vaccine Workshops in two provinces of South Africa, two in the Northern Cape, and seven in the Western Cape.

These 9 workshops were attended by 165 participants, including faith leaders and it is anticipated that they would be able to share accurate information with at least 3000 people.



HIV Faith Leader Workshop

The HIV Faith Leader Workshop aims to empower faith and community leaders with basic essential information regarding HIV and how it intersects with the other more urgent challenges perceived in a local community.

In 2022 CABSA was approached by the South African Council of Churches, Emalahleni representative, with the urgent request to train faith leaders in this municipal district in the Eastern Cape. With the support of the CHABAHIVA Trust, it was possible to offer three workshops in this area that were attended by a total of 135 people.

This is the first time CABSA witnessed such an eagerness and desire to learn more in one community and it confirms the need for accurate and relevant HIV information in the Chris Hani District Municipality, but possibly also in other rural communities.

Peer Educator Training

CABSA developed two slightly different versions of the Peer Educator Trainings: one aimed at the workplace and one aimed at faith communities, including adolescent girls and young women. This training aims to equip employees, young people or leaders as peer educators who can in turn reach out to friends, families and colleagues with accurate information, healthy attitudes and responsible and supportive behavior.

In 2022 CABSA was privileged to offer the Peer Educator Training twice. We are grateful for the partnership with CHABAHIVA Trust who is committed to Peer Educator Training as a tool to invest in communities.

Gauteng

In August, CABSA offered the Five Day Peer Educator Training to a group of women from the south of Johannesburg. It was a first ever for CABSA to have women whose ages ranged from 25 to 81 in the same training. What a wonderful privilege it was to share this space with a student, retired teachers and nurses, NGO leaders, community members, activists and members of the Mondeor Methodist Women's group!









Eastern Cape

In 2022 CABSA was fortunate to finally expand its network in the Eastern Cape and facilitate the Peer Educator Programme in the Oliver Thambo district municipality. Twenty-five young people were trained as peer educators in the village Ngcengane, outside Mthatha.

We are grateful to the CHABAHIVA Trust for making this possible and also want to note that CABSA's presence and activities in the Eastern Cape was further strengthened by our partnership with Diaconia, and cooperation with the Catholic Relief Service.

Peer Educators in Action

CABSA's Farm project was introduced in the Cape Winelands District Municipality in the Western Cape in 2016. Induction into this project is a 40 hour peer educator training, followed by regular mentoring and follow-up meetings as well as an annual one day refresher training. In 2022 two refresher trainings were offered, one in Wellington and one in De Doorns























CABSA continued to mentor and support peer educators and they were challenged to initiate and conduct community activities where they live and work. CABSA Peer Educators organised 15 Community Events in De Doorns (reaching 454 people), and 5 Community Events in Wellington (reaching 169 people).

We would like to thank CHABAHIVA Trust and Otto Per Mille for their continued support, especially in the mentoring and follow-up of existing peer educators. The fact that a number of peer educators who were initially trained in 2016 and 2017 are still active, is testimony to the value of a comprehensive project that offers support and investment beyond the initial training. The workplace training is central to the HIV Farm Project that CABSA implements as part of a project agreement with CHABAHIVA Trust.

During each of these events different pamphlets were distributed courtesy of the Christian Literature Fund. Thank you very much!

CABSA Peer Educator, Elizabeth Fredies, commented after hosting a Gender-based Violence community event:: "(During this event I learned) the importance of my role as Peer Educator in the lives of others... I make a difference and when I journey with them, they realise that they are not alone."

CABSA continues to offer a weekly online message: A Bible Message in a Time of HIV

This message is based on the Revised Common Lectionary Texts for the next Sunday and available to anyone who registers online or requests the service from admin@cabsa.org.za. For AIDS Candlelight Memorial Sunday in May and World AIDS Day in December the message includes a special liturgy that can be included in or adapted for church services.

We cannot address gender equity and GBV without doing advocacy. We cannot address HIV and Gender, without including the youth. We cannot engage the youth while ignoring their vulnerability and especially the risk of HIV infection for young adolescent girls and women.

Gender

CABSA had the opportunity to nominate participants for the Faith Leaders Gender Transformation Programme that was organised by Faith in Action and aimed to equip faith leaders as agents of change in their faith communities. Mpho Lekgetho, CCoH Facilitator in Kuruman, grabbed the opportunity wholeheartedly and finished the ten month programme.

Mpho actively promoted the Thursdays in Black campaign in Kuruman and journeyed with a group of women from her community.

Youth

CABSA's youth engagement was a highlight in 2022. From young people who voluntarily attended workshops and trainings even though it did not specifically target them as youth, youth work and social auxiliary work students who visited the office for information. pamphlets and condoms, a student volunteer, young staff members with their creativity, energy and new skills, the peer educator training in Mthatha that was initiated and organised by the inspiring young woman, Asafika Ggiba Sweleni to a small group of very young adolescents (VYA) and youth attending a holiday workshop in Lusiskisiki. CABSA is inspired by our youth and motivated to empower more young people through our services.







Advocacy

CABSA continued to use our training and workshops to promote awareness about genderequity, gender-based violence and the Thursdays-in-Black campaign. CABSA played an active role in the Gender Justice Task Team of the Dutch Reformed Church regional West and Southern Cape Synod and is a member of We Will Speak Out. However, for CABSA advocacy extends beyond gender when we advocate for the dignity, rights and worth of every human being.

CABSA has prepared special liturgies for Candlelight Memorial for almost twenty years. The Diaconia AIDS Task group became collaborators and in 2022 we took the step of not only making these guidelines available online, but to also organise a collective Candlelight Service at the Calvin Protestant Church in Athlone, Cape Town.
